This year we are proposing some small **amendments to the constitution** to make the running of the society a little more manageable. These require approval at an AGM:


- a) Currently, the date of annual meeting currently must be in April or May. Proposed change of wording to 'within 15 months of the previous AGM'
- b) Currently the Quorum at an AGM is 10 members. Proposed change to '3 members' We are always keen to welcome new members on to our committee, so please let us know at or before the AGM if you would be interested in getting more involved.

How to access the Lympstone History Society Archive

The archive of the Lympstone History Society is a collection of records, pictures, artefacts, photographs, press cuttings, event programmes, books and maps relating to the village of Lympstone, its inhabitants and its history. It is securely housed in Lympstone Village Hall.

- A member of the committee will be present while the archive is in use.
- A record will be kept of all visits to the archive.
- A record will be kept of all loans (members may borrow books, and certain other items may be loaned for a limited period, with approval).

Non-members can also access the archive. An initial visit is limited to 30 minutes. If a longer time is required then we recommend joining the Society. Protocols must be observed when using the archive including:

- If material is used for publication then an acknowledgement of the source must be included (it is the responsibility of the individual to ascertain whether material is under copyright).
- Items may be photographed only with express permission.
- Visitors to the archive may only write in pencil.
